L.O. To generate effective newspaper headlines.
To distinguish between fact and opinion.

Some will EVEN: Make deliberate choices of which words to use in sentences and what order to arrange the words, to create a particular impact. (Y6S1)

SOME will: Use technical language/precise language in my writing when needed (Y5S1)

MOST will: Use modal verbs to show if something is certain, probable or possible (or not). (Y5S1)

ALL will: Distinguish between a fact and opinion.

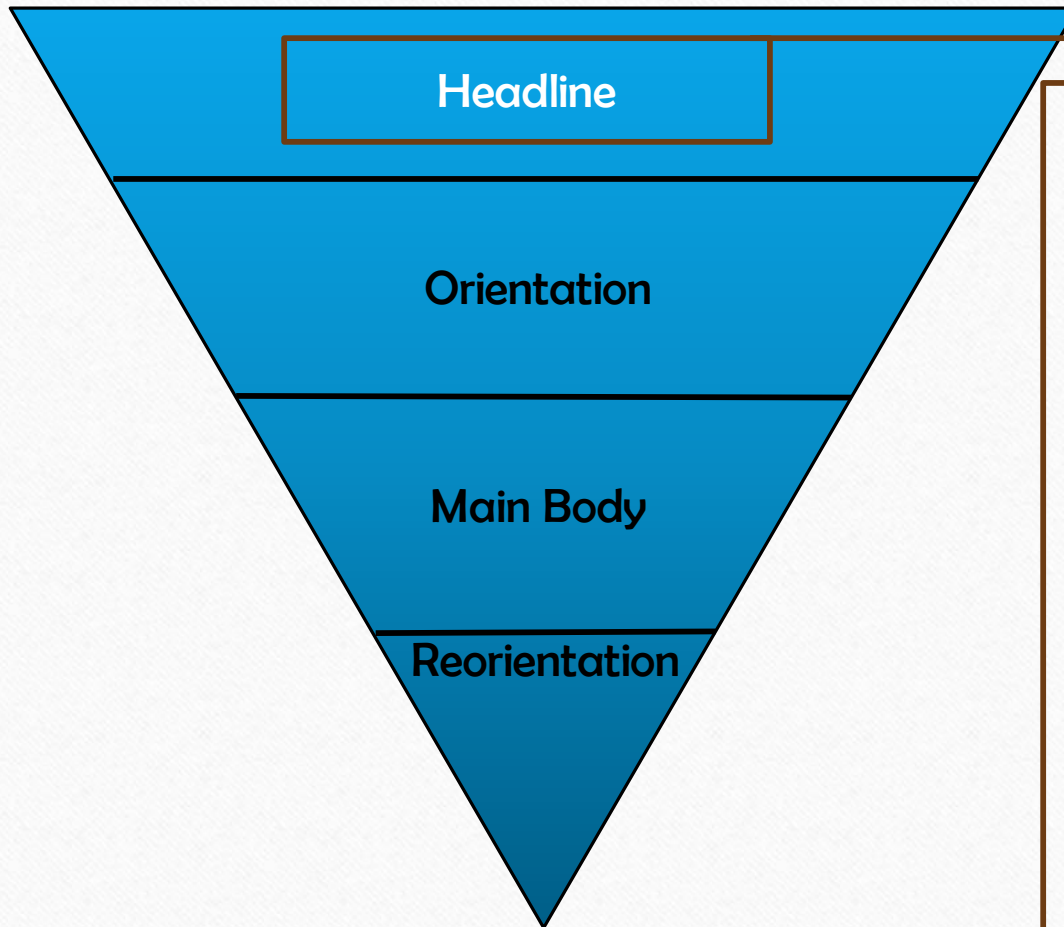

Headline



For a good headline, you need to:

- Catch the reader's attention so they want to read the rest of the report;
- Sum up the story in a few words;
- Use powerful and interesting language;
- Write in the present tense – even if the report is about an event that has already happened;
- Include alliteration or wit at times.

Rhyme

Examples:

Green queen

Glass with class

Hastings leads Pasting!

Alliteration

Bb

Often using the same letter sound at the start of your words can create an interesting effect.

Puns

A pun = a word in a sentence that can have two meanings.

Example

Christmas shoppers ~~S~~TOCKING up.

WITCH Halloween costume ~~i~~s for you?



Word/Letter play

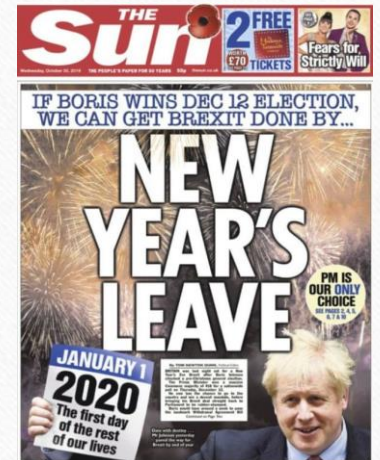
Sometimes a writer will change a letter or a word in to give a double meaning.

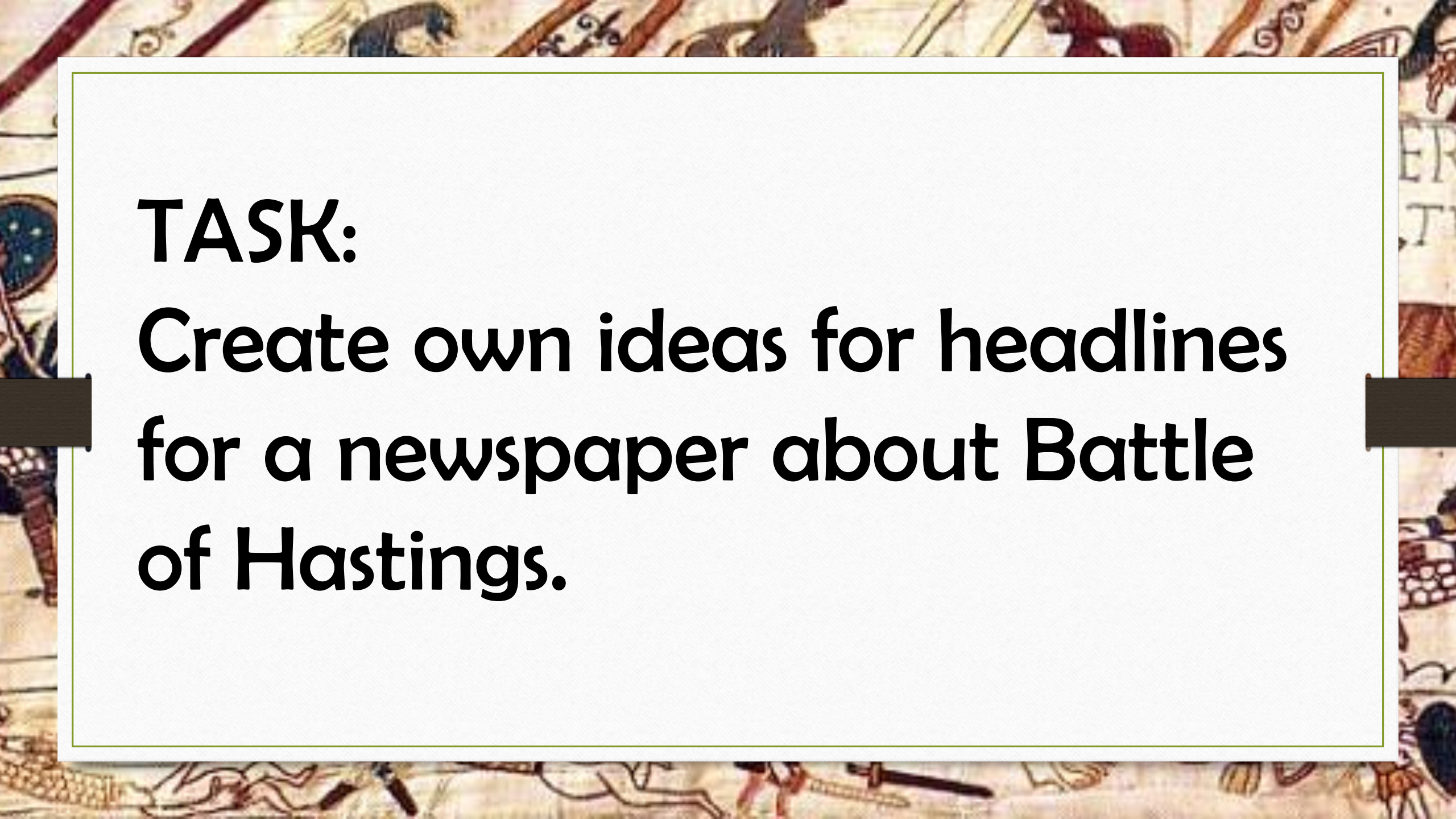

Fact: an actual thing that exists and is provable, observable, and measurable.

Look for Signal Words:

numbers	corroborate
statistics	record
verified	substantiate
document	prove
eyewitness	photographs

My Mom's new car gets 35 miles per gallon in the city and 45 miles per gallon on the interstate.

Last night, we took a photograph to prove that raccoons have been raiding our garbage cans.

Facts are certainties

Opinion: a personal belief or judgment that is not founded on proof or certainty.

Look for Signal Words:

good/bad	might
believe	should
think	guess
always	interpretation
never	point of view

My dad thinks we should get a compact car because we might get better gas mileage.

Although raccoons are cute, Mom believes they are a menace and should be taken to a wildlife sanctuary.

Opinions are disputable

The Battle of Hastings took place on the 14th October 1066.

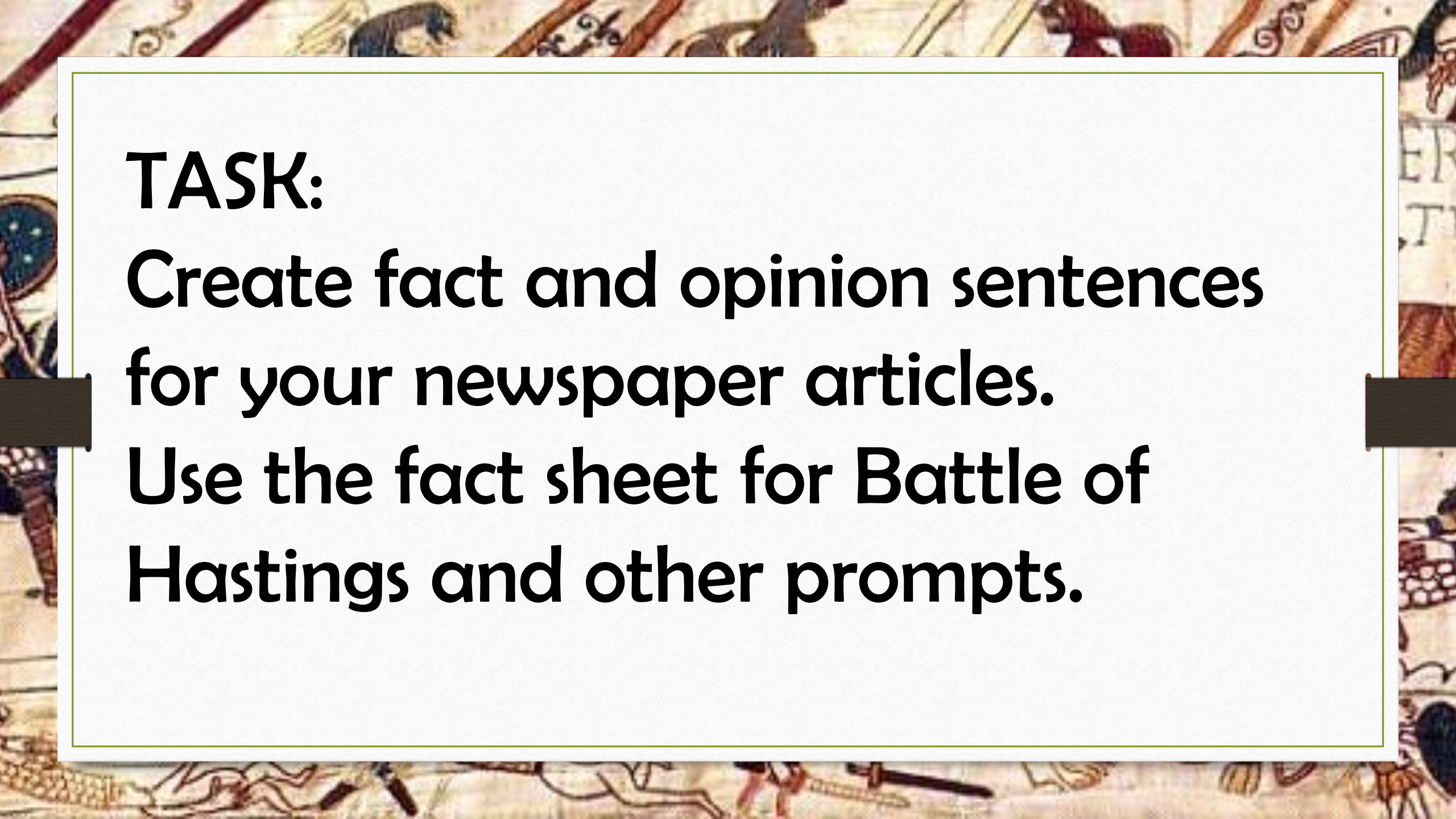
The army of William the Conqueror was successful and won the Battle of Hastings.
