What is Boccia?

Boccia is a team sport for people who have physical disabilities. However, people without a disability also play this.

How is Boccia played?

This wonder is played like a neighbouring sport Boules! Except, when this is played, the competitors are sat in a chair (usually 2 players off opposite teams) who are not allowed to move. Most of the events have balls which are coloured: Red and blue. Each of the companions are required to use 2 balls together with an addition to a white jack. Every ball closest to the gleaming white jack win a point to their team to see who will win.

What equipment is used?

Firstly, you will require 2 chair's for each competitor unless they are in a wheelchair that is when they will not require a chair but they will still need a chair as the others may not have a leg or lower body disability to need a chair. 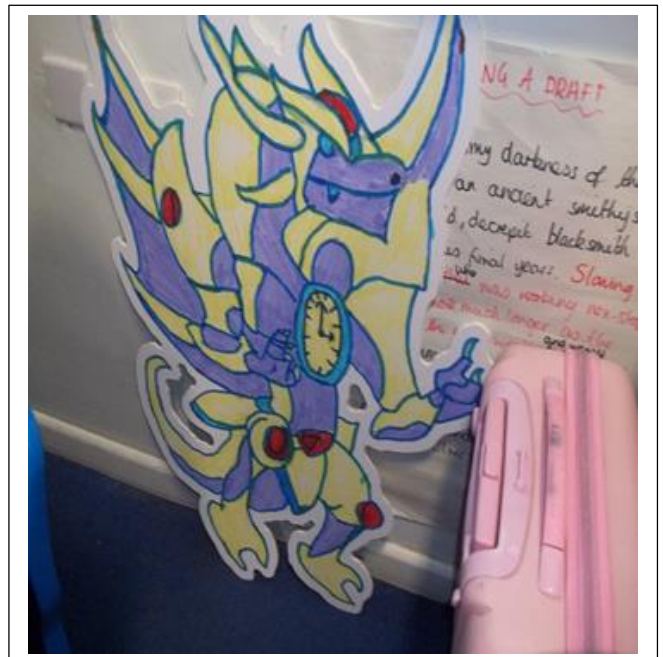
